Territorial Acknowledgement

Camosun College is located in beautiful Victoria, British Columbia, with campuses on the traditional territories of the Lekwungen and W̱SÁNEĆ peoples. We acknowledge their welcome and graciousness to the students who seek knowledge here.

What is a Certified Medical Laboratory Assistant?

- A Certified Medical Laboratory Assistant (CMLA) is responsible for pre-analytical techniques such as patient blood collection, sample collection, sample preparation, and ECG collection.
- Students learn to incorporate exemplary patient and client-centric behaviors while also learning to collect and process data required for diagnostic investigations
- The CMLA program prepares graduates for their role as integral members of the healthcare team by providing a broad foundation in laboratory science theory integrated with authentic simulation environments and workplace clinical practicums.

What are Pre-Analytical Techniques?

- The pre-analytical (before analysis) phase of laboratory medicine includes test selection, patient identification, sample collection, handling and preparation
- CMLAs are responsible for performing phlebotomy, which is the practice of collecting blood samples for an analytical purpose
- Sample collection also includes identifying patients, outlining testing requirements, giving patient instructions and maintaining sample integrity during collection
- Sample preparation involves the handling and processing of the sample in such a way to ensure quality results for the patient

Main Roles of a CMLA

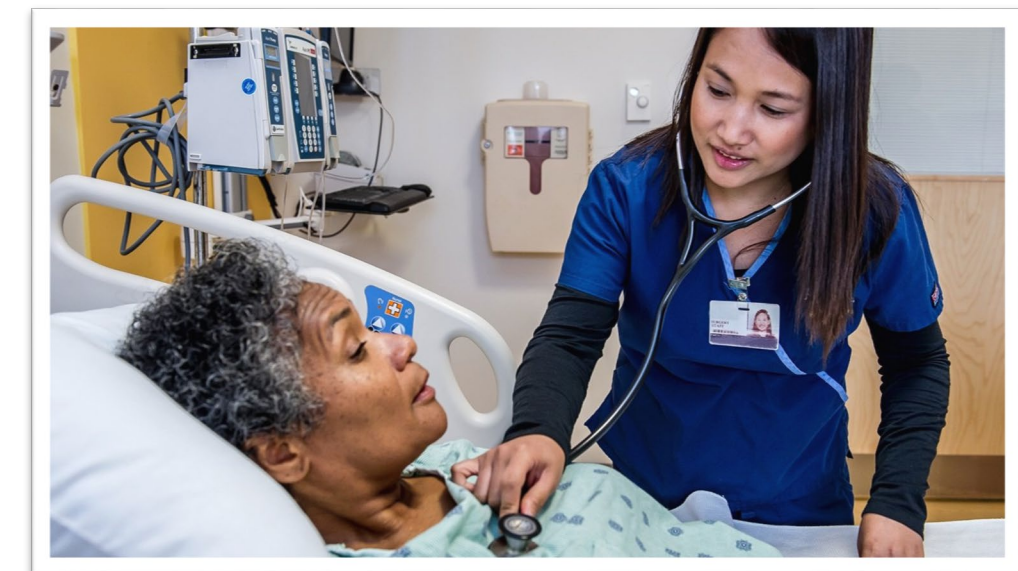

Main Roles of a CMLA

- Conduct a variety of sample collections and patient based procedures
- Provide patient instructions for the purpose of quality sample collections
- Understand and follow safety guidelines
- Think critically to problem solve and make decisions
- Work independently or with minimal supervision and work as part of a team
- Manage multiple priorities and projects
- Display flexibility in a fast-paced work environment
- Maintain the strictest levels of confidentiality
- Pursue professional development for the continual improvement of patient care

Other Roles of a CMLA

CMLAs participate in a variety of roles beyond specimen collection.

- Patient data entry of diagnoses, patient histories, and medications
- Cardiac monitoring tests (ECG testing, Holter monitor application)
- Assisting Medical Laboratory Technologists (MLTs) in a variety of departments
 - Hematology – blood counts, coagulation
 - Chemistry – hormones, electrolytes, cardiac markers
 - Microbiology – bacterial, viral, fungal infections
 - Histology – analysis of tissues
 - Transfusion Services – blood bank

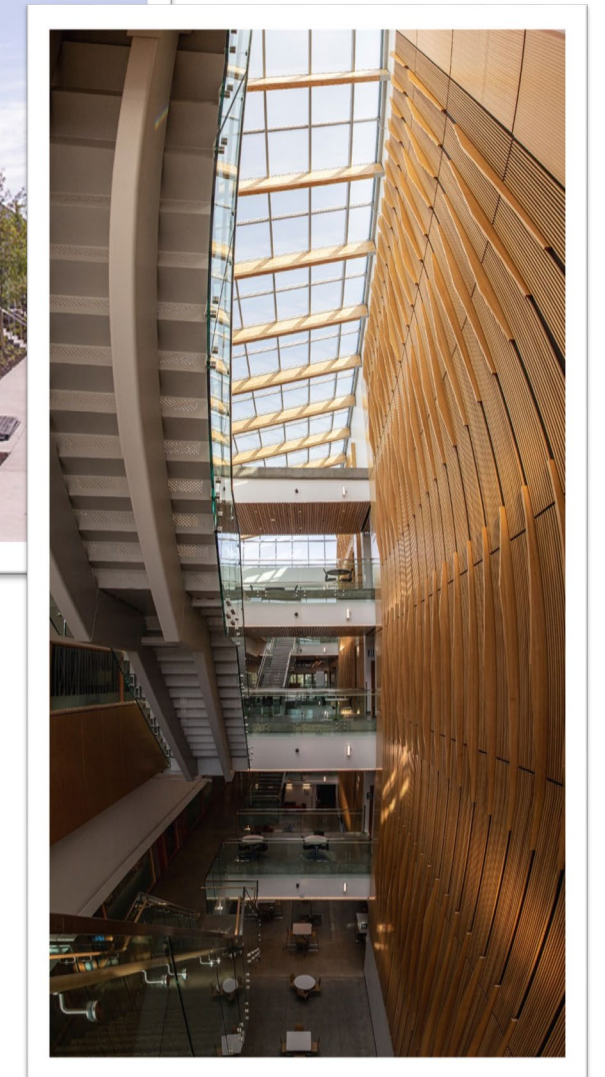

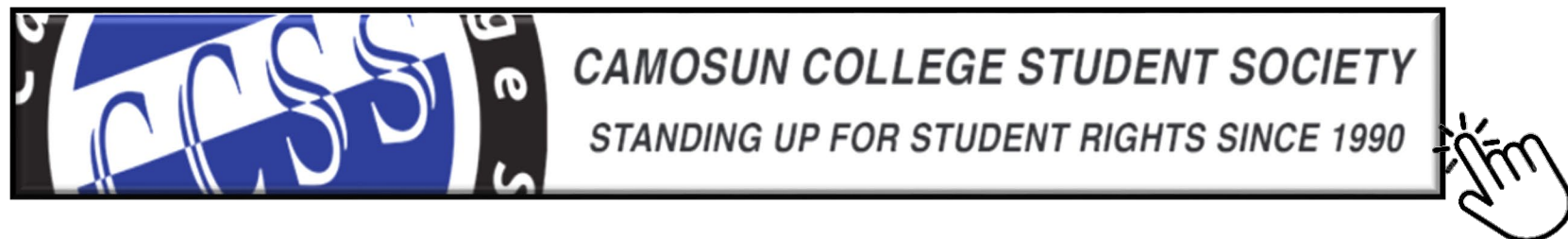
Our goal is to educate and support **“flourishing individuals, families and communities”**.

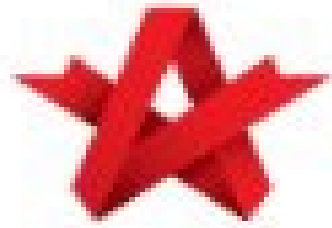

Attributes That Contribute to Success

- The ability to meet the physical demands outlined in the [Physical Requirements Form](#), including manual dexterity and fine motor skills 
- Competence in written and oral english
- Fluent computer skills and reliable access to a computer with a camera and internet
- Ability to manage time commitment to school and study
- Financial security – not having to work during the program is a plus
- Learn more about the profession; read about and talk to people who are laboratory professionals
- Enhanced anatomy knowledge

The CMLA Program at Camosun College

- Intense 10 months of study over 3 terms
- 2 academic terms followed by up to 7 weeks of full time, unpaid practicum
- Combination of classroom and laboratory experiences, including student to student phlebotomy
- In addition to using simulators, students act as surrogate patients to learn positioning techniques as well as interpersonal skills
- Flexible, blended delivery model for greater work/life balance

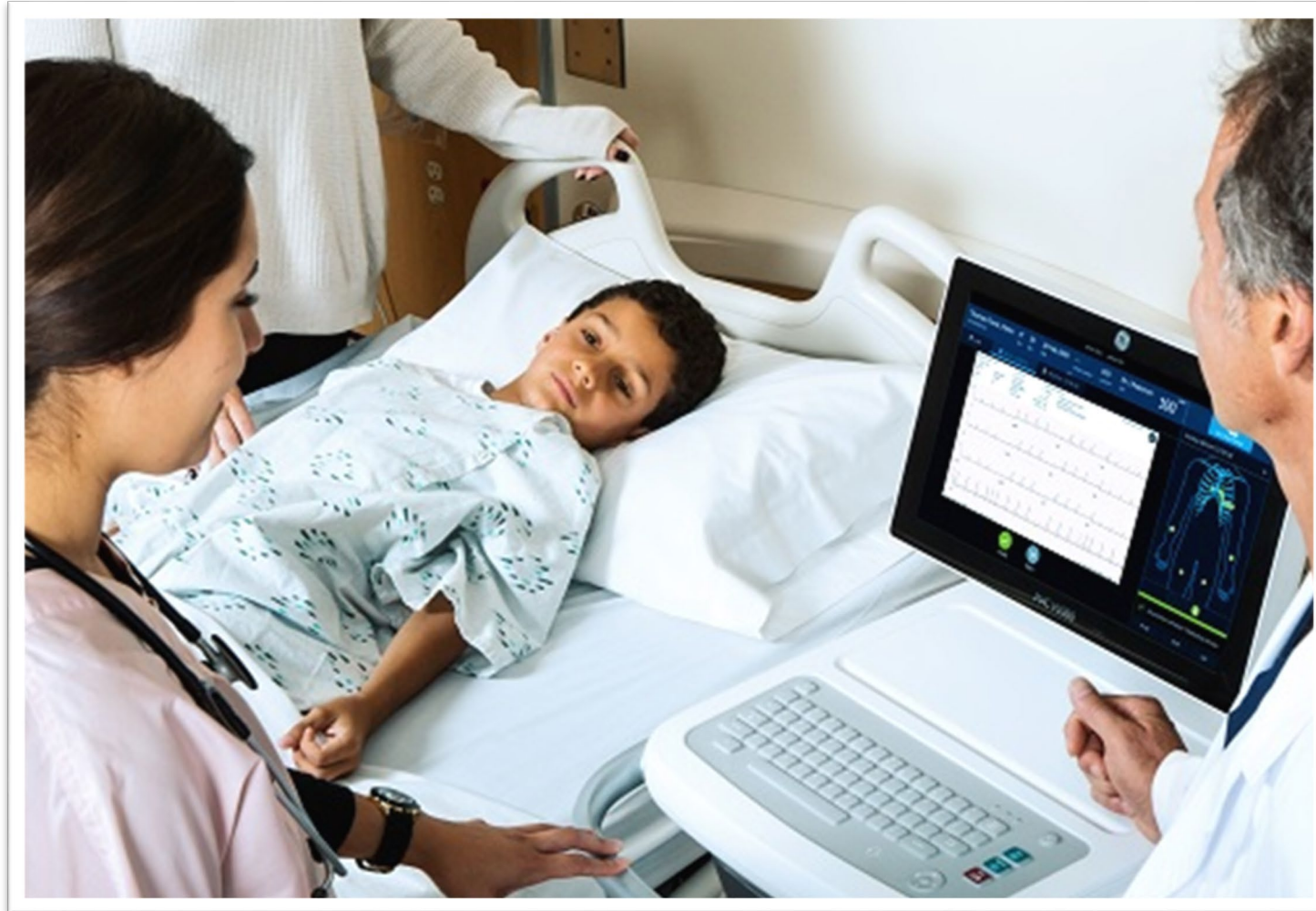

Clinical Experience

- Clinical placements will be at a variety of sites on Vancouver Island
- Students participate in one of two different clinical experiences, depending on placement availability
 - Island Health Authority
 - LifeLabs
- While we do ask students for their preference of site, there is no guarantee that students will receive their preferred site placements
- Keep in mind that students are responsible for providing their own transportation and accommodations while on their clinical placement

Post Graduation

- Can obtain national certification with [CSMLS](#)
- With CSMLS certification, eligible to work in all provinces
- Employment opportunities in BC: [Island Health](#), [LifeLabs](#), CBS and more
- Most CMLAs entering practice find immediate casual work. Casual may mean close to full time hours. Full time positions are usually filled from the casual workforce

- Median - \$25.31/hr

- Apply as soon as possible for first-qualified, first-served admission.
- Submit proof of all admission requirements in order to be added to the program list.

- English 12 (C+)*
- Anatomy and Physiology 12 (C)*
- Medical Terminology (C+)*

Additional Admission Requirements

Required for your online application:

- A completed [Physical Requirements Form](#) (this can be filled out online)
- 40 wpm keyboarding (Ratatype.com)
- Attend a CMLA information session & complete online questionnaire.
[Be sure you do the survey!](#) 
- 40 hours of volunteer work in a patient related environment (interactive role) e.g. Long-term care - requires letter from supervisor confirming 40 hours and responsibilities performed – *some health care professionals can use prior work experience.*

Program Participation Requirements

DO NOT begin these before being offered a seat!

- Students will be required to do a [Criminal Record Check \(CRC\)](#). Camosun will provide details prior to clinical work starting. Previous CRCs will not be accepted for this purpose.
- Students must have yearly N95 respirator mask 'fit-testing' done.
- Students must have completed and be current in Standard First Aid CPR Level C or Basic Life Saving prior to practicum.

Students will be responsible for the costs of these requirements.

Program Participation Requirements

Tuberculosis Testing

- Students must provide evidence that they do not have **active** TB.
- Acceptable evidence is a negative TB skin test or a negative chest x-ray dated no more than 6 months before practicum

Previously having had TB or a previous positive skin test **does not automatically** exclude a student from participation.

Students are responsible for the cost of testing.

Immunizations

- Students must provide evidence of immunizations or immunity to preventable, communicable diseases
- Students are highly recommended to maintain current immunizations as per the [Practice Education Guidelines of B.C.](#)

Failure to comply with guidelines could result in the health care organization or the College barring the individual from the practicum setting until proof of immunity is provided and/or a communicable disease outbreak is declared over. This could impact a student's ability to successfully complete the practicum rotation.

Estimated CMLA Program Costs

□ Tuition (Domestic)	\$15,123
□ Tuition (International)	\$20,770
□ Application Fees	\$41.82
□ Text Books	\$500-700
□ Expendable Supplies Paper, binders, pens, photocopying, discs, printer cartridges etc.	\$100-300
□ Name Tag, Uniforms & Shoes (Students must purchase uniforms at Camosun College Bookstore)	\$200-400
□ Certification/Professional Fees (BCSLS membership)	\$85
□ Certification/Professional Fees (CSMLS National Certification Exam)	\$190-390
□ Program Requirements (Criminal Record Check, TB test, Mask Fit Testing, Immunizations, etc.)	\$150-300

This total **does not** include parking, travel costs, relocating, or living accommodations while at school OR practicum.
